

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

ABOUT THE PROJECT


The Cello House is a comprehensive renovation and extension of a mid-century home in Cheltenham, designed for Catherine Hewgill, Principal Cellist of the Sydney Symphony Orchestra, and her husband, a renowned Australian film director. The project, led by Perennial Interiors, involved the addition of a mezzanine studio and a fully self-contained unit beneath the original residence—transforming the existing structure into a multi-layered sanctuary celebrating light, connection, and creative expression.


Inspired by the organic curves of the cello, the design explores the interplay of positive and negative space, using form, flow, and verticality to create movement through the home. The architectural language draws from the home's mid-century origins while integrating soft, sculptural gestures that echo the couple's love for music, nature, and storytelling.

Themes of new beginnings, openness, and harmony resonate throughout—from the layered circulation paths and curved spatial dividers to the thoughtful use of natural light, warm timbers, and tactile materials.

This project represents not just a second life for the home, but a meaningful transition for its owners—a new phase marked by reflection, creativity, and the freedom of semi-retirement. Designed to support evolving lifestyles, the home offers spaces for solitude and connection, work and rest, music and movement. It's a place where the past is honoured, the present is embraced, and the future unfolds with intention.


THE CURVES OF A CELLO






My first concept came from the shape of a cello, using curved, organic dividers to separate the spaces. Maximising flow and movement in the space was key. Bringing the outside in was also key to this concept - prioritising the expanse of windows and connection to the outdoors.

CURVES IN THE NEGATIVE





After some feedback, I realised that using curves in such an angular building was going to be far too difficult. Thus, the concept of curves in the negative was born - creating the dividers as solid, angular forms to reflect the existing building, and working with the flow and movement created through navigating the space.


The main entry leads into the heart of the home, where a sculptural divider conceals the kitchen. To the north, the master suite sits beside stacked wet areas, while the sunlit open-plan living space includes a sunken lounge, fireplace, and full-height library wall.

Above, the mezzanine level offers a flexible retreat for work, rest, or guests. Anchored by a central stair core, it features a spacious corner desk and a custom built-in bed nook—balancing privacy with connection to the home below.

FLOORPLAN LOWER GROUND (UNIT)



The lower ground floor features a fully self-contained unit with a private courtyard entry. Flooded with natural light from north- and east-facing glazing, the space includes open-plan living, a work nook, separate bedroom with ensuite, and a discreet laundry.







ABOUT THE PROJECT

Narnia House is a custom-designed inner-city residence for a couple of passionate treechangers who have relocated from the countryside to vibrant Woolloomooloo. Owners of a lifestyle culinary brand, they host cooking classes and intimate gatherings, requiring a home that's both a sanctuary and a social space. Their values—sustainability, connection to nature, and a love of art, music, and design—shape every part of the brief. They sought a home that would honour their rural roots while embracing their new urban lifestyle, and that balance between past and present, groundedness and surprise, became the core of the design concept.

Inspired by the idea of a hidden portal, the home reveals itself slowly: an unassuming street-facing door opens into a lush internal courtyard, bathed in light and encircled by stacked volumes.

Spanning three levels, the design embraces vertical circulation and transparency, anchoring each floor to the central void. Generous glazing, automated louvres, and pop-out balconies immerse the interior in natural light while blurring the line between indoors and out.

Materials, lighting, and joinery are thoughtfully layered to express a sense of openness and individuality. From the entertainer's kitchen and courtyard to the couple's serene top-floor retreat, the home balances bold gestures with quiet intimacy—creating a space that surprises, shelters, and evolves.

The Green Flamingo is a boutique hotel that reimagines the grandeur of Art Deco through a distinctly Inner West lens—playful, eclectic, and grounded in community. Housed in a restored former bank in Tempe, the design celebrates the building's architectural heritage while breathing new life into its spaces through sustainable practices and locally sourced materials, art, and furnishings.

Inspired by the spirit of the nearby Tempe Croquet Club, The Green Flamingo blends nostalgic charm with contemporary luxury. Upstairs, sophisticated and spacious hotel rooms offer guests a refined retreat infused with American Modernist influences and Art Deco elegance. Downstairs, the hotel opens itself to the community: by day, a retro milk bar invites locals in for casual comfort and connection; by night, the space transforms into a moody, intimate speakeasy evoking the glamour and secrecy of the 1920s.












The Canopy of the Future is a conceptual interior design project that explores the intersection of biophilic design and science fiction through a bold and imaginative café and reception space. Inspired by organic forms, retro-futurism, and the idea of nature reimagined, the design is anchored by a large sculptural element—a central tree-like canopy that defines movement, atmosphere, and spatial experience.

Developed through sketching, physical modeling, and iterative exploration, the project began with a fascination for how nature can be translated into futuristic interior architecture. The design concept, "bio-futurism," blends the natural and artificial, softness and structure, light and shadow. Curved forms, reflective surfaces, and tactile materials create a layered spatial journey that is both immersive and thought-provoking.




















CONCEPT BOARD

The space is divided into a café and reception area, united by terrazzo flooring, soft lighting, and sculptural circulation pathways. Zones of privacy are created through raised platforms and built-in furniture, while verticality is emphasized through columns, lighting voids, and the canopy itself. Material choices-ranging from metallic wall cladding to warm timber and Corian-further reinforce the project's conceptual duality.

The Canopy of the Future is not only a spatial proposal, but a sensory narrative—inviting guests to imagine, reflect, and connect in a world where design bridges the organic and the otherworldly.



The Park Road Project is a playful yet refined redesign of a small inner-city home, tailored to a couple who value bold expression, classic design, and practical living. Focused on the kitchen, bathroom, and stair zones, the project blends vintage inspiration with contemporary materials to create joyful, layered interiors that elevate daily routines.

A key idea throughout the home is contrast through progression—from dark to light, solid to open, private to shared. This is most evident in the staircase, where dark timber and rich tones at the base transition into lighter finishes and translucent elements above, connecting the mezzanine with the ground floor. Fluted amber glass, marine ply, and sustainable finishes like Baux acoustic pulp and recycled rubber nosing enrich the tactile experience and bring personality to transitional spaces.

In the kitchen, checkerboard tiles, timber veneer, and a rich red palette create warmth and intimacy at the home's core. Storage is maximized through under-stair cabinetry and integrated appliances, keeping the look clean and intentional. Upstairs, the bathroom plays with pattern, colour, and texture to deliver a bright, family-friendly space that balances function and creativity.

The Park Road Project is a vibrant, expressive, and thoughtful home upgrade that proves good design can be both timeless and fun.

Inspired by the colorful energy of the 70s and the eclectic charm of the area, the design aims to create a welcoming retreat amidst the bustling streets of Newtown. The primary objective of this project was to transform a compact 27sqm studio into a functional yet stylish living space that embodies the owner's love for fun colors, poppy prints, and 70s-inspired decor. Additionally, the design needed to prioritize comfort and practicality, catering to the owner's frequent travels (this is her second residence) and need for a cozy sanctuary to unwind.

Bold colors, playful patterns, and retro furnishings come together to create the perfect haven. Designing for a compact studio posed several challenges, including optimizing space utilization, ensuring adequate storage, and creating distinct living zones within a limited area. Additionally, striking the right balance between bold design elements and a cozy atmosphere required careful planning and execution.

CONCEPT BOARD

To meet storage needs on a tight budget, we used customized IKEA solutions instead of custom joinery, which was quoted at eight times more expensive. This approach saved costs while delivering functional, stylish storage tailored to the client. The adapted units helped define living and dining zones, provided media storage, and included hidden compartments for bulkier items—achieving a smart balance of practicality, aesthetics, and affordability.

When the studio was sold in May 2025, the thoughtful renovations and vibrant design paid off significantly—adding over \$100,000 to the sale price after less than 2 years. The clever use of space, bespoke storage solutions, and bold yet inviting aesthetic made the property stand out in a competitive market. Buyers were drawn to the unique character and turnkey appeal of the studio, proving that smart design choices and a strong sense of style can translate into real financial value.
