




# **.ABOUT ME**



# **.CONCEPT DEVELOPMENT**

The concept for the Boutique Hotel is inspired by Australia's diverse landscape, inviting guests on a journey of discovery through space and place. The design reflects the natural beauty and cultural richness of the land, creating an immersive experience that connects visitors with local stories and environments.

The guest rooms are based on the Compass theme, representing the four cardinal directions of Australia: north, south, east, and west. Each room captures the unique characteristics of its region through carefully selected materials, colours, and textures, celebrating the country's varied landscapes. The bar is inspired by the seasons of Australia, with interiors and menus that evolve to reflect the natural cycles and climate changes throughout the year. This dynamic space offers guests a fresh and engaging experience, emphasizing sustainability, local produce, and a welcoming atmosphere rooted in nature and community.


# **.DESIGN PROCESS**

This project began with observing the Australian landscape — a meeting of nature's curves and human-made lines. I explored this contrast through sketches and material studies, blending organic textures with geometric forms. Natural materials like stone and timber were paired with concrete and steel, creating tension and balance. The design evolved through testing light, layout, and form, aiming to create interiors that feel both raw and refined, grounded in place and shaped by contrast.








Wayfarer Hotel offers more than just a room we provide an experience. Guests enjoy thoughtfully designed rooms inspired by the Australian landscape, with comfortable beds, ecofriendly amenities, and local art. Our seasonal bar serves drinks and dishes made with local ingredients. The hotel features communal lounge areas, bike hire, a small gallery space, and curated walking guides to explore the Inner West. We also host workshops and pop-ups with local makers and artists. Friendly staff are always here to help, share stories, and make your stay feel relaxed, creative, and connected to the local

#### SPACE

The Wayfarer Hotel is designed to feel like a journey through Australia. The lobby, called Landscape of Australia, welcomes guests with raw textures like exposed brick, spotted gum timber, and earthy tones. It reflects the diverse natural beauty of the land. Guest rooms are called Compass and themed by direction - north, south, east, and west with calming clay walls, natural fibres, and layered textures. The bar and ounge, Seasonal Australia, shifts with the seasons to create fresh experiences. Spaces are easy to explore with clear pathways. The design is warm, creative, and sustainable, using local art and eco



#### PEOPLE

Wayfarer is for young professionals, creatives, design lovers, and eco-friendly travellers who want more than just a hotel room. Our staff are locals who understand the Inner West and care about art, culture, and the environment. We work with local makers, First Nations artists, and ethical suppliers to make sure the hotel feels true to the community. We also team

up with nearby cafes, galleries, and small

businesses that share our values.

#### STORY

The Wayfarer Hotel takes the guest on a journey through Australia's unique landscape. Set in the heart of Sydney's Inner West, it brings together the colours of the land, the voices of local artists, and the feeling of freedom on the road. Each space reflects a part of Australia from bush to beach, city to desert. The bar changes with the seasons, and the rooms are inspired by maps and directions. Wayfarer is more than a stay, it's a journey. Here, guests can explore, rest, and connect with the country's rich history and natural beauty and culture.

#### IDENTITY

Wayfarer Hotel is a boutique stay that celebrates Australia's land, people, and stories. Located in Sydney's Inner West, we blend local culture, sustainable design, and creative spirit. Every space in the hotel reflects a part of Australia's landscape and history from the rooms to the bar and shared areas. We support local artists, use ethical materials, and aim to create a warm, welcoming space for curious travellers. Wayfarer is not just a place to sleep it's a place to feel connected, inspired, and part of something bigger. We are proud to be rooted in community and country.

#### CHANNELS

Wayfarer Hotel connects with guests through poutique hotel platforms like travel websites, and by teaming up with local tourism boards. We also promote the hotel through creative events that bring the community in. Each week, guests can join art walks around the Inner West, enjoy live music or seasonal drinks at the bar, or stretch out with yoga on the terrace. Our "Meet the Maker" nights introduce local artists CONTENT

Wayfarer's content tells a story of sustainability, creativity, and respect for culture. 
































CAFE

The Redfern project involves the adaptive reuse of an existing warehouse, focusing on the design of a cafe, lobby, and new stair. The objective is to create vibrant, functional spaces that respect the building's heritage while introducing contemporary elements. The cafe will activate the street frontage, the lobby will offer a welcoming entry experience, and the stair will act as a central sculptural feature, connecting the ground and upper levels. The design will explore materiality, movement, and light to enhance user experience, with all interventions responding sensitively to the building's history and urban context.

# **.CONCEPT DEVELOPMENT**


The inspiration for my design came from a ladder. I visited a cafe where the timber ceiling looked like a ladder, and it immediately connected with the historical and industrial feel of the Redfern building. This idea gave me a creative direction for the space. I decided to use the form of a ladder to guide the layout and choice of materials, bringing in timber slats and metal details to create a sense of vertical movement and connection. The staircase will be a standout feature, using raw, industrial materials with modern touches to highlight it as a key element in the design.

These are my early sketch ideas for the concept model. I explored the ladder's simple, vertical shape and its repeated elements to influence the design. The sketches focus on capturing lightness, movement, and strength, while keeping a minimal and industrial look. The ladder idea ties the entire space together in a way that feels natural and connected to the building's history.
































CHELTENHAM HOUSE Redesign a Mid-Century Modern home for a fashion photographer, preserving its original character while aligning with the client's creative vision. Signature MCM elements like clean lines, timber joinery, open-plan flow, and floor-to-ceiling glazing are retained and enhanced to maximise natural light and strengthen the indoor-outdoor connection. Inspired by the client's work, which often explores the relationship between humans and nature through black-and-white composition, the design embraces a timeless style. The interior palette balances warm, natural textures with high-contrast moments, allowing the photographer's refined, monochromatic imagery to be integrated into the interiors as both inspiration and artwork.


# **.CONCEPT DEVELOPMENT**

The concept is inspired by the camera a tool for capturing moments and the time-less features of Mid-Century Modern (MCM) design. Like a camera frame, the layout creates clear views, strong lines, and focused spaces. It reflects how a photographer sees the world: through light, shadow, and thoughtful composition. The home balances function and beauty, using open spaces, natural materials, and a simple, elegant structure. It blends work and living needs while respecting the original MCM style. Large windows and sliding doors connect the indoors to the outdoors, allowing natural light, fresh air, and garden views to become part of daily life. This design is not driven by trends. It is calm, grounded, and timeless a space that grows with its owner, supports creativity, and stays connected to nature, history, and the art of seeing.














# **.DESIGN PROCESS**







HOUSE

This project involved converting an empty warehouse shell in Woolloomooloo, Sydney, into a calm and functional home for a fashion agent. The design focuses on wellness and creativity, providing a private sanctuary that balances relaxation with professional requirements. Key features include dedicated spaces for yoga, meditation, reading, and quick vegan meal preparation. A flexible work and showroom area supports client meetings, sample storage, and consulting. The interior incorporates soft ambient lighting, integrated artwork, and natural, tactile materials to create a grounded, peaceful environment that supports both personal retreat and productive work.

# **.CONCEPT DEVELOPMENT**

The concept for this project is Tree, inspired by the contrast between the tall warehouse building in Woolloomooloo and a single tree growing nearby. This quiet yet powerful moment led to the idea of bringing the strength, calm, and presence of nature into the home. The design aims to create a peaceful sanctuary within an urban context for a fashion agent whose lifestyle is deeply rooted in wellness, yoga, meditation, and self-care. The tree, as a symbol of growth and grounding, offers a meaningful framework to support the client's physical and emotional wellbeing. The spatial planning reflects the tree's natural structure, with vertical, horizontal, and organic movement guiding the flow of the home. Each level is designed to suit a different mode of living. Level 1: Public – social space for relaxation and entertaining. Level 2: Work – flexible studio and fashion showroom. Level 3: Private – quiet retreat for rest and reflection. Natural materials, earthy textures, and soft lighting contribute to a layered, nurturing interior that brings nature indoors offering stillness, strength, and space to grow.


The concept uses the tree's form branches as space to explore vertical and horizontal flow. Steps become levels of experience, echoing growth, connection, and movement through layered natural structure.




# **.DESIGN PROCESS**

The design is inspired by the form and presence of a tree, ts grounded trunk, expansive branches, and layered structure. This natural hierarchy informed both the vertical and horizontal circulation of the home. Like a tree, the space grows upward with purpose: from a grounded, open base for social connection, to elevated branches that host work and retreat spaces. Vertical circulation mimics the upward growth of a trunk, connecting the levels through a central spine, while horizontal movement flows organically like branches reaching outward, allowing each area to unfold naturally. This spatial rhythm creates a harmonious balance between movement and stillness, openness and privacy.























### **.CONCEPT DEVELOPMENT**

The design is based on the elements of nature, linking the kitchen, bathroom, and staircase through Earth, Water, and Air. The kitchen is grounded in the element of Earth, using natural materials like timber, stone, and terracotta to create a warm, tactile space. This design prioritises functionality and connection, offering a calm and welcoming environment for daily family life. The earthy tones and textures bring a sense of stability and comfort, making the kitchen the heart of the home. Inspired by the fluidity and calm of water, the bathroom features smooth curves and soft finishes. Materials such as tadelakt, stone, and glass evoke a spalike atmosphere that invites relaxation and renewal. Gentle lighting and organic forms work together to create a peaceful sanctuary where the body and mind can unwind. The staircase embodies the lightness of air. Floating timber steps paired with glass balustrades allow natural light to flow freely between levels. The open, minimalist structure connects the floors without interruption, creating a gentle and airy transition that enhances the home's overall sense of space and movement.


